Purpose

To provide parents/carers and other members of our school community with an overview of Grey Street Primary School's approach to fundraising.

Policy

Fundraising is an important way for Grey Street Primary School to raise money so that it can provide additional funds to the school to improve school amenities, purchase additional learning items such as books, instruments or information technology supports, etc.

Fundraising is a function of the school council and council must approve all fundraising events or activities on behalf of our school.

At the beginning of each school year, the school council will approve any fundraising events or activities for the upcoming year. If it is necessary during the year, the school council may approve additional fundraising events or activities.

In deciding whether or not to approve particular fundraising events or activities, the school council will act in accordance with legal requirements, any relevant Department of Education and Training policy or guideline, and the Department's *Finance Manual for Victorian Government Schools*.

All money raised through fundraising, unless legally otherwise provided for, will be held on trust by the school council for the general or particular purpose for which it was raised.



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Implementation:

The School Council will review/approve a list of fundraising activities. This will occur at the beginning of the year when School Council committees are formed.

Fundraising activities may be undertaken:

- to establish or augment a school's general funds; or
- for a specific school purpose.

School council must approve allocation of fundraising proceeds before spending (e.g. installing shade sails, upgrading library books or computers). The funds raised must be held in a separate sub-program in CASES 21, and must be held separately from funds used for fundraising administrative purposes.

All fundraising activities will be identified to the school community as such, and will only involve voluntary participation. Any profits (and losses) associated with fundraising activities will be reported to the wider community and all transactions related to fundraising activities will be reported to School Council.

Unless the Fundraising Act 1998 otherwise provides, all funds raised for a Government school by fundraising activities must be held in the relevant sub-program account by the school council in trust for the purpose for which they were raised.

Grey Street Primary School must not enter sponsorship arrangements with organisations involved with tobacco or alcohol products.

When considering sponsorship, the school should take into account the:

- values and views of the school community
- school's strategic plan
- educational value of any activities directly involving students in fundraising.

The school must obtain permission and instructions from the Victorian Commission for Gambling Registration before conducting a raffle or bingo.

The school should seek advice from Consumer Affairs Victoria before undertaking any activities involving the consumption or sale of alcohol and need to be aware of both the Liquor Control Reform Act 1998 and the Gambling Regulations Act 2003, if the school is considering using liquor as a prize.

Fundraising for Charitable Causes

Grey Street Primary School, through the Junior School Council and class based projects (eg. Fighting extinction), may also decide to fundraise for charitable causes. In deciding whether or not to fundraise for a particular charitable cause, school council may:

 Consider whether the methods used to raise funds for any specific charitable appeal are appropriate



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• Seek written advice from organisations promoting fundraising activities on the percentage of funds raised that are directed to the named charity.
